Did you know...

The first New Ross Fair was held in 1944. It was started during the war years to raise money for the Red Cross. The first fair was held in the field behind the now Post Office and the Anglican Church Rectory. It often spilled out into the road and that is why the land was purchased where the fair is presently held and has been since 1944.



The Farmer's Association

The residents of the Forties, western New Ross, were always active in promoting any project for community development. In 1944, helped by the interest in agriculture of Reverend A.S. Hart, Parish Priest for the Anglican church in New Ross, a new agricultural society was organized. Officers elected were: President, Courtney Keddy; Vice-President, Aubrey Hiltz; Secretary, Mrs. Millage Gates.

Interest in the society spread and in 1946 eastern and western New Ross unified to form the present branch of the Federation of Agriculture. Courtney Keddy, re-elected president held that office for 10 years; Mrs. Harry Lantz, secretary, for 11 years. Monthly meetings were held alternately at Keddy's Hall, Forties, Lake Ramsay schoolhouse, and Charing Cross.

Apart from its primary purpose of furthering the pursuit of agriculture, this association has worked for the betterment of community life. In its first year the New Ross Fire Department was given a donation of \$1,000 by the Farmers' Association toward the purchase of fire fighting equipment. They worked also for rural electricity, re-building and hard surfacing of the Chester Basin to Kentville highway, and consolidation of the many small school sections into the present New Ross Consolidated School.

Being unable to secure a resident doctor for New Ross because living accommodations were not available, the members of the Farmers' Association decided to build a house to be used as a doctor's residence. Under the

management of a committee, land was purchased, a house was erected; and was first occupied by D.A. Campbell, M.D. for some years, but he later moved to Bridgewater.

Did you know...

That in 1964 there was a ferris wheel at the fair? The amusements were the compliments of Thomas' Rides of Mahone Bay. There were also pony rides.



In 1946 the Farmers' Association purchased 7 acres of land for a fairgrounds. A building containing a central kitchen and two dining rooms, a cattle barn and a dance pavilion were built. Later several smaller buildings containing booths for different purposes were added. In 1965 the dance pavilion was used as a base for the erection of a building for exhibition purposes which houses the exhibits of the women's division of household arts and crafts and flower show of Charing Cross Garden Club. A Community Fair lasting two days has been held here annually. The ox and horse pulling has been a major attraction with many competing teams brought from other districts in Lunenburg County and from the adjoining counties of Kings and Hants.
