Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP)

Soon it will be that time of the year - Income Tax Prep! Mona Thomarat has been approved again for this year by CRA to prepare free tax returns in our community at the New Ross Family Resource Centre. Mona will be receiving the software in mid-February from CRA, so shortly after that she will start setting up appointments /preparing returns.

The CVITP is a free tax service for completing basic tax returns for individuals with modest incomes.

- \$35,000 for individuals
- •\$45,000 for couples

(If your income is slightly over these amounts, chat with Mona to see if she can proceed.)

The CVITP does NOT cover preparing tax returns that have rental income or business tax situations.

Last year Mona completed 29 tax returns, of which CRA sent grant money to the Resource Centre. Win win for the community!

In Memory



~ A tribute to my Dad ~

On Christmas Eve, at 3:33 p.m., my Dad drew his last breath and left this world. He was 81 years old. My Mum and I were there holding his hand and he slipped away peacefully and without pain. If he had to die, I couldn't ask for a better experience for him.

At his request there will be no funeral.

Despite a remarkable comeback from pneumonia, he caught Covid, just days before he was to be discharged for home. As a result of the Covid infection, he developed a number of blood clots in his legs and lungs, and after a few days he suffered a mild but significant cardiac event, and then his kidneys shut down. Ironically, his breathing wasn't the thing that caused his body to fail.

He was still bright and alert until the last two days, when he drifted in and out of sleep.

My Dad was a wonderful father; a kind, brilliant man who was also my mentor and my friend. He was a huge ally and advocate for his only grandchild, Vi, and loved sharing time with them during visits, and exchanging regular texts from afar.

He and Mum were married for 56 wonderful years, and together for 58. They suited each other so well, and loved spending their spare time together. They spent many hours landscaping their property and decorating their home exactly as they wanted, with a style to rival anything you'd find in Architectural Digest.

Dad worked many years in the provincial government, retiring as a Deputy Minister in 1995. He went on to work a few retirement (I called them "hobby") jobs at several different municipal organizations and governments, where he used his exceptional skills at organizing and putting things back on track.

He loved reading, architecture and all sorts of motorized machines, including airplanes. He loved and cherished my Mum very much. He delighted in spending time with his nieces and nephews, who gave both him and my mum a lot of joy before I was born.

He enjoyed listening to music, and was always playing something enjoyable on long car drives. A fond memory is of going to concerts with him and mum when I was a child; artists like Willie Nelson and John Denver. He loved Neil Young the most and was listening to him just before he passed. He loved when Nathan played for him, including his own private concert while in the ICU. He was proud to have such a fine musician as his son-in-law.

He loved animals too, especially horses and dogs (and with my persuasion, also cats, lizards, turtles and fish.) The sole exception was for any animal that dug up the yard (foxes), stole the grapes off of our grapevines/tore up the garbage (raccoons) or made a noisy mess (Canada Geese).

He would never harm any of them, but he certainly enjoyed chasing the geese off of the property by using a ride on lawnmower.

He was always my biggest supporter, whether it was studying art, or studying aviation. I couldn't have asked for anyone more proud.

It seems unreal that he is gone. He will be missed so incredibly much. Thank you everyone, for your love and support the last few months. It has made this entire ordeal easier. Please don't let him be forgotten.





UPDATE

A group of local businesses and volunteer organizations, meet monthly to discuss all things New Ross. This month we chatted about the success of the New Ross Christmas Festival and plans for next year's festival, along with a review of some of the upcoming activities over the next couple of months.

Here are some of the things going on in our community that you might be interested in hearing about.

- Development of a tourism map for the area, to be circulated at local businesses.
- Saturday, February 8th, 3-5 pm, the Nova Scotia Lobster Crawl comes inland to Forest Heights Community School, for an event called From the Sea, a design challenge created in partnership with Foraged Florals and Tourism Chester. It is to encourage creation of designs made from items found on the beaches. You can enter on the chester.ca website and make plans to see the entries.
- The New Ross Fair Grounds are busy booking out to groups and events again this summer, which promises to be very active.
- Ross Farm is increasing the number and variety of workshops being offered during this off season, and to great response. Keep your eyes peeled for opportunities to learn about spoon making, barrel making and more.
- Plans are in the works for a Winter Frolic at the Fair Grounds for February 15th.

Update from Tina Connors Councillor - New Ross (District 6)

A quick reminder that the Municipal Tax Exemption deadline is March 31. Contact me with any questions.

Comfort Centres: During times of emergency situations, such as severe winter storms, high intensity rain fall, or extended power outages, Comfort Centres have been established throughout the province by communities for communities. These Centres are intended to be a location where community members can gather, be warm and safe, be a place of information, have a hot drink and maybe even something to eat! In New Ross the Comfort Centre is the *fire hall*. Thank you New Ross Volunteer Fire Department.



Strategic Planning: Working together, Council and staff have approved five priority areas - Good Governance & Corporate Excellence; Strategic Growth & Development; Strong Communities; Sustainable Infrastructure; Active Healthy Living - as part of our Strategic Plan 2025-2028. The Strategic Plan forms the basis for the work plans of all municipal departments: action items; projected timelines; and resource allocation. Planning sessions continue, with additional fine-tuning ahead, including an *Implementation Plan* to achieve identified goals and outcomes.

Recent Discussions at Council Table:

- > 2025 Nova Scotia 55+ Games September 21 to 25 / novascotia55plusgames.com will be held in Lunenburg and Queens counties, with 22 events scheduled, taking place at 24 venues throughout the region, with projected economic impact of \$550,000;
- > Church Memorial Park recent presentation, re: New Recreation Facility Initiative, including proposed Planning and Execution Team (with Council representation), plus Capital Campaign/ Fundraising Team;
- > NEW Sidewalk stretch of road from fire hall to fairgrounds; design work nearing completion and under review by regulatory agencies, pre-budget approval for upcoming fiscal year. (FYI: sidewalk Hwy 12/Forties Rd intersection to the fire hall still in the plans, with possible construction [of both sections] to now take place consecutively.)

Volunteer Award Program: Plans are in the works for National Volunteer Week 2025, and volunteer nominations are open! Nomination categories include: Individual; Youth; and Family, and nominees must be residents of the Municipality. Contact the Municipal Recreation Office – recreation@chester.ca / 902-275-3490 - with any questions, including nomination guidelines & form. Deadline is March 7.

2024-2025 Committees: Annual Council appointments, for me, include: Building Code & Unsightly Premises; Community Use of Schools Committee: Aspotogan Community Elementary School and Forest Heights Community School; Lunenburg County Seniors' Safety Advisory Partnership; RCMP Advisory; South Shore Regional Library Board; and Sherbrooke Lake Park Advisory Committee.

Winter = skating, right? Sure hope so... the **New Ross Rink** is open for business, and all we ask is for Mother Nature's cooperation! A BIG shout-out to all involved, and fingers crossed for *more* cold temps!


